AACAP Catchers in the Rye Humanitarian Award

The AACAP Catchers in the Rye Humanitarian Award is awarded by the AACAP Executive Committee. It was established in 1990 to honor those who have made a sustained and significant contribution to pediatric mental health through activities such as advocacy, education, entrepreneurship, philanthropy, research, and/or acts of bravery/kindness. AACAP is honored to present the 2023 Catchers in the Rye Humanitarian Award to Governor Gavin Newsom & First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom.

Gavin Newsom, Governor of California, former Lieutenant Governor of California, and former Mayor of San Francisco, is widely recognized for his willingness to lead—repeatedly developing, advocating, and implementing innovative and groundbreaking solutions to some of our most challenging issues. On a wide range of topics including same-sex marriage, gun safety, marijuana, the death penalty, universal health care, access to preschool, technology, criminal justice reform, and the minimum wage, Governor Newsom stuck his neck out and did the right thing, which often led to sweeping changes when his policies were ultimately accepted, embraced, and replicated across the state and nation.

Governor Newsom's top priorities for his administration are tackling the state's affordability crisis, creating inclusive economic growth and opportunity for every child, and standing up for California values—from civil rights, to immigration, environmental protection, access to quality schools at all levels, and justice.

Governor Newsom is married to Jennifer Siebel Newsom. They have four children: Montana, Hunter, Brooklynn, and Dutch.

Jennifer Siebel Newsom is the First Partner of California, an award-winning filmmaker, an influential advocate, and thought leader on gender equality. Ms. Newsom serves as honorary chair of the California Volunteers Commission, co-chair of the Governor's Advisory Council on Physical Fitness and Mental Well-Being, and co-chair of the California Farm to School Working Group. Building on her work as First Partner, Ms. Newsom co-founded the California Partner's Project (CPP), a nonprofit dedicated to promoting gender equality and child wellbeing.

Ms. Newsom graduated with honors from Stanford University and Stanford's Graduate School of Business.



AACAP Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award

The AACAP Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award is awarded by AACAP's President. It was established in 2013 to celebrate the lifetime achievements of extraordinary women in the field of child and adolescent psychiatry. As its namesake envisioned, the award is for women who have applied their talent, medical skills, and leadership to dramatically improve the wellbeing of children with mental illness. AACAP is honored to present the 2023 AACAP Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award to Clarice J. Kestenbaum, MD.

Clarice J. Kestenbaum, MD, is Professor Emerita of Clinical Psychiatry, Columbia University Irving Medical Center. The former director of residency training in child and adolescent psychiatry at Columbia, Dr. Kestenbaum is the recipient of an endowed professorship in education and training. Dr. Kestenbaum is past president of AACAP and of the American Academy of Psychoanalysis and Dynamic Psychiatry. Dr. Kestenbaum is also the co-founder of CARING at Columbia, an organization that helps at-risk underserved children through the arts and literature. The recipient of numerous awards for her leadership and service, Dr. Kestenbaum has a broad range of expertise and focuses on child development, psychopathology, and children at risk for bipolar disorder and schizophrenia. Dr. Kestenbaum continues to teach and supervise medical students, general psychiatry residents, and second-year residents in outpatient psychotherapy. She is a consultant to the Center of Prevention and Evaluation at New York State Psychiatric Institute. Dr. Kestenbaum is a graduate of the Columbia University Center for Psychoanalytic Training and Research in both general and child and adolescent psychoanalysis.

I am so deeply honored to receive the 2023 Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award. I want to thank Warren Ng for his exemplary leadership. In the 50 years that I have known Ginger, she has always been the heart and the driving force of the Academy. She has helped countless children, adolescents, and their families achieve successful lives through her commitment, intelligence, integrity, compassion, and humor. She is a role model and inspiration for women everywhere.



AACAP Sidney Berman, MD, Award for the School-Based Study and Treatment of Learning Disorders and Mental Illness

Lois T. Flaherty, MD

The AACAP Sidney Berman, MD, Award for the School-Based Study and Treatment of Learning Disorders and Mental Illness acknowledges outstanding leadership in the public education and treatment of learning disabilities. Albert Abramson, president of the Abramson Family Foundation, established this award in 1996 as a tribute to founding member and AACAP Past President (1969-71) Sidney Berman, MD.

The trailblazing work of Lois T. Flaherty, MD, in developing school mental health programs in Baltimore in the 1980s led to the formation of the National Center for School Mental Health, and the dissemination of the Baltimore models throughout the United States. Throughout her career she has focused on working with underserved populations in school and community settings, with a particular interest in adolescents, and she has published widely in these areas. Dr. Flaherty earned an MD at Duke University and completed an internship in internal medicine at the Georgetown University Division of DC General Hospital. She went on to complete residencies in general psychiatry at Georgetown and in child and adolescent psychiatry at the Johns Hopkins Hospital. At the University of Maryland, where she was an Associate Professor and served as head of the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, she developed innovative programs in training for child and adolescent psychiatrists. Dr. Flaherty is a Distinguished Fellow of AACAP as well as of the American Psychiatric Association, and a recipient of the Schonfeld and Staples Awards of the American Society for Adolescent Psychiatry, and the Distinguished Service Award from the APA.

The Klingensteins Third Generation Foundation Award for Research in Depression or Suicide recognizes the best paper published in the Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry on depression and/or suicide, written by a child and adolescent psychiatrist, and published between July 2022 and June 2023. The award is supported by the Klingensteins Third Generation Foundation, which established this award in 1999.

Benjamin I. Goldstein, MD, PhD, is a child and adolescent psychiatrist and Professor of Psychiatry and Pharmacology at the University of Toronto. He holds the RBC Investments Chair in Children’s Mental Health and Developmental Psychopathology at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health, where he is Director of the Centre for Youth Bipolar Disorder. Dr. Goldstein’s efforts focus on bipolar disorder in youth. His team seeks to generate insights regarding the link between bipolar disorder and cardiovascular disorders, and to identify and implement innovative prevention and treatment strategies that focus simultaneously on physical and mental health. Dr. Goldstein has authored over 280 scientific articles and has received international awards for his research.

It is a tremendous honor to accept this award on behalf of my team. This award is inspiring, reflecting the committee’s recognition of the importance of advancing our understanding of mechanisms underlying depression in youth. I wish to express my profound gratitude to the Klingensteins Third Generation Foundation for choosing to focus this award on depression, which remains the leading cause of functional disability in youth worldwide, and which requires steadfast efforts to improve outcomes for those affected.




AACAP Irving Philips, MD, Award for Prevention

Jess P. Shatkin, MD, MPH

The Irving Philips, MD, Award for Prevention recognizes a child and adolescent psychiatrist and AACAP member who has made significant contributions in a lifetime career or single seminal work to the prevention of mental illness in children and adolescents. The award is named after former AACAP President Irving Philips, MD (1985–1987) who was renowned for his work in the field of prevention.

Jess P. Shatkin, MD, MPH, graduated from University of California, Berkeley in 1985. He received an MPH from the University of North Carolina in 1988 and his MD from SUNY Downstate in 1996. Prior to medical school he worked as a health educator in HIV prevention and at Superfund Hazardous Waste Sites training workers in occupational safety and health. Following residency at University of California, Los Angeles, he worked for two years with the National Health Service Corps in Arkansas, before becoming Medical Director of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry at the University of Pittsburgh. He has been at the New York University (NYU) Grossman School of Medicine since 2006, where he is Vice Chair for Education, Child Fellowship Program Director, and Professor of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry and Pediatrics. In 2006, Dr. Shatkin established the department of Child and Adolescent Mental Health Studies (CAMS), which he chairs at the NYU College of Arts & Science. Now one of the largest undergraduate departments at NYU, CAMS teaches nearly 7,000 students in 54 unique courses each year and has been emulated at universities nationally. His work in CAMS, along with his program development work in adolescent risk and resilience, publications, weekly national call-in radio program on SiriusXM, and numerous health promotion and disease prevention innovations, have brought a profound and broad increase in awareness to the mental health needs of children, adolescents, and their families.

The AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Award for Scientific Achievement recognizes the best paper published in the Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry from July 2022 through June 2023. Established in 1988, the award is supported by the Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Foundation.

Jean A. Frazier, MD, is the Executive Director of the Eunice Kennedy Shriver Center at University of Massachusetts Chan Medical School. She holds the Robert M. and Shirley S. Siff Endowed Chair in Autism and is a Tenured Professor of Psychiatry and Pediatrics. Since 2020, Dr. Frazier has been the Medical Director of the Massachusetts Child Psychiatry Access Program for Autism (ASD) and Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD)—a program that supports the Massachusetts Crisis Intervention Teams in their work with those with IDD and autism during behavioral crises. She is the founder of the Center for Autism and Neurodevelopmental Disorders (CANDO) clinical program. Dr. Frazier served as a Vice Chair of Psychiatry and as the Division Director of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at UMass Chan Medical School from 2008–2018. She has devoted 3 decades of her life to improving the lives of individuals with neurodevelopmental disorders. Her research expertise is in clinical trials, biomarker and neuroimaging studies, and studies of psychiatric outcomes among those born preterm and across neurodevelopmental disorders. Dr. Frazier has published 192 peer-reviewed journal articles and 30 book chapters. She is a highly sought out mentor and teacher and has won numerous awards for her educational efforts including the Outstanding Educator Award for Mental Health Education from the New England Educational Institute.

I am extremely grateful to receive this award. Though this award is given to me as the first author, it truly is shared by a whole team of colleagues and collaborators who contributed to the final manuscript and most especially by the youth and families who participated in this longitudinal study. I am hopeful that the data from this manuscript will pave the way for enhanced screening for psychiatric disorders in preterm born youths within primary care and will lead to interventions that have the promise of improving associated functional impairments and participatory roles.



AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Psychodynamic Psychotherapy Award

The winning paper addresses the use of psychodynamic psychotherapy in clinical practice and fosters development, teaching, and practice of psychodynamic and psychotherapy in child and adolescent psychiatry.

Amanda K. Hutchison, MD, is a board-certified adult and child psychiatrist, and psychoanalyst in private practice in Denver, Colorado where she sees patients of all ages in psychoanalysis and psychotherapy. She completed medical school, psychiatry residency, and child and adolescent psychiatry fellowship at the University of Colorado School of Medicine where she is now a Clinical Instructor. She is a faculty member and instructor at the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis and for the Western Consortium for Child Analysis.

AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Service Program Award for Excellence

Muhammad Waqar Azeem, MD

The AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Service Program Award for Excellence recognizes innovative programs that address prevention, diagnosis, or treatment of mental illness in children and adolescents and serve as model programs to the community. Supported by the Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Foundation, the Award was established in 1996.

Muhammad Waqar Azeem, MD, is the Inaugural Chair of Psychiatry for Sidra Medicine in Doha, Qatar, and Professor of Psychiatry at Weill Cornell Medical College. He and his team have played an instrumental role in establishing child, adolescent, and women's mental health services in Qatar from scratch. His team at Sidra Medicine developed the world's first and only ACGME-I Training Program in child and adolescent psychiatry. He is Director of the World Psychiatric Association (WPA) Collaborating Center. Dr. Azeem has contributed nationally to a number of important initiatives, including being Chair of Qatar's National Autism Plan Working Group, Co-Chair of the WISH Autism Forum, and a member of the National Mental Health and Wellbeing Task Force. He is a member of the AACAP Global Mental Health and International Relations Committee as well as the Inpatient, Residential, and Partial Hospitalization Committee. Internationally, he is Chair of the WPA Working Group on Medical Students and a member of the WPA Working Groups on Autism and Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. He has presented nationally and internationally and has published extensively in peer-reviewed journals. Dr. Azeem did his general psychiatry training at Hennepin County Medical Center and Regions Hospital in Minnesota. He did his child and adolescent psychiatry training at Children's Hospital Boston with Harvard Medical School. He also holds a voluntary faculty position at Yale Child Study Center.

Building a system of mental health services for children, adolescents, and women in Qatar was a dream of a nation; being a part of that dream and helping it to become a reality has been rewarding and inspiring for mental health professionals, not just in the country but the whole region. Our team is making a significant difference for children, women, and families in most need.



AACAP Jeanne Spurlock, MD, Lecture and Award on Diversity and Culture

James P. Comer, MD, MPH

The AACAP Jeanne Spurlock, MD, Lecture and Award on Diversity and Culture recognizes individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the recruitment of child and adolescent psychiatry from all cultures. This award was established in 2012 in honor of Jeanne Spurlock, MD, a giant in child and adolescent psychiatry and in advocacy for children, adolescents, and their families from all cultures.

James Comer, MD, MPH, is the Maurice Falk Professor of Child Psychiatry at the Yale University Child Study Center. Dr. Comer has focused his career on enabling public schools to promote child and adolescent development, and the education of low-income and minoritized children in particular. In 1968, he founded the Comer School Development Program, a development and learning process that facilitates the collaboration of parents, educators, and community to improve social, emotional, and academic outcomes for children that, in turn, help them achieve greater school success. The process has been used in more than 1,000 schools throughout the United States and abroad. His work has led to ways of working that are transforming the field of education, including the concept of social and emotional learning and preparation for life skills for students from all backgrounds. He has authored numerous publications and received many awards for his work, including 50 honorary degrees, most recently in June from the University of Chicago. In 2014, President Barack Obama appointed Dr. Comer to his Advisory Commission on Educational Excellence for African Americans, and in 2016 he became a member of the Aspen Institute's National Commission on Social, Emotional, and Academic Development. Dr. Comer received an MD from Howard University College of Medicine. He is a member of the National Academy of Medicine and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

The AACAP George Tarjan, MD, Award for Contributions in Developmental Disabilities recognizes a child and adolescent psychiatrist and AACAP member who has made significant contributions in a lifetime career or single seminal work to the understanding or care in the field of intellectual and developmental disabilities. The award was established in 1993 in honor of former AACAP President George Tarjan, MD (1977–79), by his wife, Mrs. George Tarjan and friends.

Roma Vasa, MD, is a Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and a practicing child psychiatrist at the Kennedy Krieger Institute. She serves as Co-chair of AACAP's Autism and Intellectual Disability Committee. Dr. Vasa attended Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and completed a year of internal medicine training at Columbia Presbyterian Hospital, after which she pursued general psychiatry and child psychiatry training at Johns Hopkins. Dr. Vasa's interest in developmental neuropsychiatry was kindled during her rotation at the Maudsley Institute in London where she cared for patients with brain injuries and was cultivated through a long-term collaboration with the late Dr. James Harris. At Kennedy Krieger, Dr. Vasa built and presently oversees one of the largest psychiatric programs in the country for children with autism. She also created and leads the Developmental Neuropsychiatry Scholars Program, a novel one-year advanced training program that provides intensive mentored clinical and academic experiences to future leaders in the field. Her current research focuses on identifying and treating transdiagnostic markers of anxiety (eg, intolerance of uncertainty) in autism and developing interventions to curtail mental health crisis. Dr. Vasa also enjoys mentoring faculty to help them achieve their career goals.

I am honored to receive the 2023 George Tarjan, MD, award from my colleagues at AACAP. I am committed to upholding Dr. Tarjan's legacy of leadership by advocating for holistic care for individuals with developmental disabilities and extending these principles to subgroups with marginalized identities. In dedication to this service, I would like to thank my exceptional colleagues who have supported my ideas and shaped my professional path, including Drs. James Harris, Rebecca Landa, John Campo, Jeremy Veenstra-VanderWeele, Natasha Marrus, Kathleen Koth, and many others.



AACAP Simon Wile, MD, Leadership in Consultation Award Joyce N. Harrison, MD

The AACAP Simon Wile, MD, Leadership in Consultation Award acknowledges outstanding leadership and continuous contributions in the field of consultation-liaison child and adolescent psychiatry. The award is named after Simon Wile, MD, a renowned pediatrician and lifelong supporter of child and adolescent psychiatry, and it was established in 2003 with a donation from the Massachusetts General Hospital.

Joyce N. Harrison, MD, is an Associate Professor of Clinical Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and at Kennedy Krieger Institute, a hospital for children and young adults with neurodevelopmental disorders. She entered the triple board residency program at Tufts in 1987, when the program was in its second year. She directs Kennedy Krieger Institute's Network for Early Childhood Tele-education (KKI-NECT), which provides tele-consultation for developmental, behavioral, and emotional problems in children aged 0 to 6 years. Her areas of interest are infant and preschool mental health, integrated care, and trauma. She is co-chair of AACAP's Infant and Preschool Committee, president of the Infant Mental Health Association of Maryland-DC, and an executive member of the American Academy of Pediatrics Council on Healthy Mental and Emotional Development (COHMED).




