

The AACAP Catchers in the Rye Humanitarian Award is awarded by the AACAP Executive Committee. It was established in 1990 to honor those who have made a sustained and significant contribution to pediatric mental health through activities such as advocacy, education, entrepreneurship, philanthropy, research, and/or acts of bravery/kindness. AACAP is honored to present the 2024 Catchers in the Rye Humanitarian Award to Alicia Koplowitz.

Alicia Koplowitz Romero de Juseu is the chair of Omega Capital, an investment company she created in 1998. For eight years, Ms. Koplowitz was the Vice-President of the Board of Directors of the company, Fomento de Construcciones y Contratas. She left in 1998, selling her entire shareholding in the company.

As an expression of her social commitment, Ms. Koplowitz created the Foundation that today bears her name, the Alicia Koplowitz Foundation, of which she is Lifetime President. Established in 1995, the Foundation focuses on two primary areas; social services and medical-scientific initiatives. In the social services area, the Foundation provides care, support, and protection in foster homes for children and adolescents from dysfunctional families, as identified by the Community of Madrid, helping them integrate into society. In the medical-scientific area, the Foundation organizes programs to promote research and training in child and adolescent psychiatry and pediatric neurology. Each year, the Foundation awards two-year scholarships for advanced training in these specialties at hospitals in the United Kingdom, the United States, and Sweden. It also provides grants for short placements abroad for other types of academic training; assistance for research projects in psychiatry and the neurosciences relating to children and adolescents; and organizes training courses and meetings for professionals in these fields led by nationally and internationally respected specialists. In Madrid, the Foundation built and donated the Alicia Koplowitz Centre for the In-Patient Treatment and Rehabilitation of Multiple Sclerosis Sufferers, which has 96 inpatient sites, 32 day-center sites and 30 outpatient sites. The Foundation donated the Centre to the Autonomous Community of Madrid, which manages it and finances its operation, with the Foundation monitoring its work via a commission.

Ms. Koplowitz is an Honorary Member of the Spanish Society of Psychiatry, Honorary Member of the Spanish Association of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (AEPNYA), Patron of the Princess of Asturias Foundation, Patron of the Cultural Advisory



Board of the La Caixa Banking Foundation, Member of the Board of the Union Centrale des Arts Décoratifs (UCAD), Member of the European Advisory Board of Christie's, Member of the Board of the Peres Centre for Peace in the Middle East, Patron of the SHE Foundation, Patron of the Friends of the Prado Museum Foundation, and International Ambassador of the Feuerle Collection.

Ms. Koplowitz has received numerous honors and awards. She was made a knight of France's Légion d'honneur. She is an Honorary Academic of the Royal Academy of Fine Arts of San Fernando and Honorary Academic of the Spanish Medical Surgical Academy. Other honors, awards, and distinctions include being named: the Autonomous Community of Madrid's Gold Medal recipient; the Gran Cruz de la Orden del Mérito Civil; and the Gran Cruz de Alfonso X El Sabio.

In addition, the Foundation has received an impressive number of awards including: the Gold Medal of the Red Cross and Red Crescent; the Mental Health Award from the Padre Menni Hospital Centre; and the Maimonides Award from the Asociación Amigos Universidad de Tel Aviv España.

Ms. Koplowitz studied at the French Lycée in Madrid and completed her education with various courses in economics and fine arts in Spain and Europe.

The AACAP Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award is awarded by AACAP's President. It was established in 2013 to celebrate the lifetime achievements of extraordinary women in the field of child and adolescent psychiatry. As its namesake envisioned, the award is for women who have applied their talent, medical skills, and leadership to dramatically improve the wellbeing of children with mental illness. AACAP is honored to present the 2024 AACAP Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award to Karen Dineen Wagner, MD, PhD.

Karen Dineen Wagner, MD, PhD, is the Professor and Chair of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston.

Dr. Wagner received her medical degree from the State University of New York at Stony Brook and her doctorate in clinical psychology from Temple University in Philadelphia. She completed her residency in psychiatry with Harvard Medical School at Beth Israel Hospital and completed a fellowship in child and adolescent psychiatry with Harvard Medical School at McLean Hospital.

Dr. Wagner is an internationally recognized expert in the pharmacological treatment of childhood mood disorders. Her work has contributed to the development of evidence-based treatments for children and adolescents with major depression and bipolar disorder.

Dr. Wagner is the recipient of numerous honors, including receipt of an Honorary Doctorate, State University of New York; Blanche F. Ittleson Award for Research in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, American Psychiatric Association; Colvin Award for Outstanding Achievement in Mood Disorders, Brain and Behavior Research Foundation; Mood Disorders Research Award, American College of Psychiatrists; and Klerman Senior Investigator Award from Depression and Bipolar Support Alliance.

Dr. Wagner has served in leadership positions including the National Advisory Mental Health Council of the National Institutes of Health, President of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, and President of the American Association of Directors of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.

I am honored to have been selected for the Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award. I have a longstanding admiration for Ginger and her dedication to AACAP. I am proud to be standing in the line of women who have received this award along with those who will in the future.

Albert Abramson, president of the Abramson Family Foundation, established this award in 1996 as a tribute to founding member and AACAP Past President (1969–71) Sidney Berman, MD.

Shirley D.A. Alleyne, MBBS, is the Director of the Psychiatry Residency Training Program at Lakeland Regional Health and an Associate Professor at Nova Southeastern University. She completed her medical training at the University of the West Indies and her psychiatry residency and child and adolescent psychiatry fellowship at Upstate Medical University and Yale Child Study Center. In her eighteen-year career, Dr. Alleyne has held roles such as Mental Health Advisor for the WHO, Councilor at Large, and Co-Chair of the International Relations Committee of the AACAP, and Associate Program Director for the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Fellowship Program at the University of Florida.

Dr. Alleyne is a member of various committees, including the American Association of Directors of Psychiatry Residency Training's Neuroscience and Mentorship Committees and AACAP's Clinical Essentials and Schools Committees. Her career has focused on mentorship in medicine and developing mental health services for underserved communities, often utilizing the school system for clinical, policy, and advocacy work. She has received numerous awards, including the University of Florida Exceptional Educator Award and the Nova Southeastern University Medical Student Mentorship and Research Awards.

Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation Award for Research in Depression or Suicide, supported by the Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation

Tony T. Yang, MD, PhD

The Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation Award for Research in Depression or Suicide recognizes the best paper published in the Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry on depression and/or suicide, written by a child and adolescent psychiatrist, and published between July 2023 and June 2024. The award is supported by the Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation, which established this award in 1999.

Tony T. Yang, MD, PhD, is a Professor at the University of California, San Francisco and board-certified child and adolescent psychiatrist who specializes in diagnosing and treating depression in adolescents. His research has been funded by several grants from the NIH and private foundation grants from the Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation, Brain & Behavior Research Foundation, and other funding agencies. Dr. Yang is currently Principal Investigator (PI) on three separate grants in adolescent depression. He is currently PI on an NIH grant that focuses on studying the effects of an innovative mindfulness-based, fully-remotely delivered group intervention for the treatment and prevention of adolescent depression that was originally conceived and developed in his research lab at UCSF. Dr. Yang is also PI on another current NIH grant to examine and understand the effects and underlying mechanisms of the addition of probiotics to standard first-line treatments for adolescent depression. Dr. Yang is also PI on an additional new grant to apply a precision medicine approach to the understanding and development of clinical translational tools and interventions to help with the prevention and treatment of adolescent depression. He is also presently a co-I on another NIH grant to study the effect of an innovative clinical treatment intervention to improve sleep and depression in depressed adolescents.

AACAP Elaine Schlosser Lewis Award for Research on Attention-Deficit Disorder

Samuele Cortese, MD, PhD

The AACAP Elaine Schlosser Lewis Award for Research on Attention-Deficit Disorder is given annually for the best paper published in the Journal of the American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry, written by a child and adolescent psychiatrist, and published between July 2023 and June 2024. The award was established in 1994 and is supported by the Elaine Schlosser Lewis Fund, a fund named in honor of the late mother of AACAP member Owen Lewis, MD, a special education teacher and child advocate.

Samuele Cortese, MD, PhD, is currently NIHR Research Professor, Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at the University of Southampton and Bari, and Honorary Consultant for Solent NHS Trust. Prof. Cortese's main research interests are around neurodevelopmental disorders. He has published more than 400 peer-review papers. He has secured funding as main/co-applicant for more than £ 13 M. In 2022, he was included in the top 1% of scientists in the field of psychiatry/psychology (*Web of Science*). Since 2022, he ranked #1 worldwide in terms of expertise on ADHD (*Expertscape*).

AACAP Irving Philips, MD, Award for Prevention

The Irving Philips, MD, Award for Prevention recognizes a child and adolescent psychiatrist and AACAP member who has made significant contributions in a lifetime career or single seminal work to the prevention of mental illness in children and adolescents. The award is named after former AACAP President Irving Philips, MD (1985–1987) who was renowned for his work in the field of prevention.

Balkozar S. Adam, MD, is a child and adolescent psychiatrist with Burrell Behavioral Health and a professor emeritus of psychiatry at the University of Missouri. Dr. Adam is a renowned clinician, researcher, educator, mentor, and advocate. She is a child and adolescent psychiatrist with decades of experience working with children and their families. She is a distinguished life fellow of both the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and the American Psychiatric Association. She served on a number of committees and executive boards, including the Council of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and the AACAP Assembly Executive Committee. She is also a member of the APA Council for Children, Adolescents and their Families, the AACAP Life Members Committee, the AACAP Diversity and Culture Committee, the Greater St. Louis ROCAP Executive Committee, and the Missouri Psychiatric Physicians Association Executive Committee. She has presented at national and international conferences on a wide range of topics, with a focus on prevention and providing culturally informed care to patients as well as immigrant and refugee mental health. She has received numerous awards, including the APA 2023 Agnes Purcell McGavin Award for Distinguished Career Achievement in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, a Lifetime Achievement Award in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, the 2019 Jeanne Spurlock, MD, Award on Diversity and Culture, and the 2019 AACAP Assembly Catchers in the Rye award for an individual. She previously served as Medical Director of the inpatient child and adolescent psychiatry unit of Mid-Missouri Mental Health Center and of Turning Point Child Psychiatry Unit at Arkansas Children’s Hospital.

I have dedicated my career to increasing awareness and prevention of mental illnesses as well as providing culturally informed care to patients, including the underserved and the immigrants and refugees.

AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Award for Scientific Achievement

Tonya White, MD, PhD

The AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Award for Scientific Achievement recognizes the best paper published in the Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry from July 2023 through June 2024. Established in 1988, the award is supported by the Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Foundation.

Tonya White, MD, PhD, heads the Section of Social and Cognitive Development Neuroscience within the Intramural Program at the National Institute of Mental Health. She has an eclectic educational background, having received Bachelor's (*magna cum laude*) and master's degrees in electrical engineering prior to completing medical school at the University of Illinois (James Scholar) and later obtaining a PhD from Erasmus University. She completed a Triple Board residency at the University of Utah and a postdoctoral research fellowship at the University of Iowa under the mentorship of Dr. Nancy Andreasen. Following her postdoctoral research fellowship, Dr. White was a junior faculty member at the University of Minnesota for eight years. She joined the faculty at Erasmus University Medical Centre in 2009 to set up and direct the neuroimaging program within the Generation R study, which is a large population-based study of child development. She left her position as Professor of Pediatric Population Neuroimaging two years ago to join the NIH. Her primary research focus lies in understanding the underlying neurobiology of neurodevelopmental disorders, including the intersection between developmental neuroscience and epidemiology. Dr. White has published 284 peer-reviewed journal articles, 32 book chapters and editorials, and one children's book.

I would like to thank the Rieger Foundation and AACAP for this amazing honor. It was a team effort and I highlight Elisabet Blok, a future child and adolescent psychiatrist with a great future. Also, I stand amazed at the nearly 70% participation rate in the Gen R Study, even after 20 years of being poked, prodded, asked many questions, and imaged. I thank the JAACAP for creating registered reports. While the process took much time (and waiting), I hope that more research publications take this route. Finally, the paper has tremendous implications for how we understand brain/behavior interplay over time.

The AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Psychodynamic Psychotherapy Award, supported by the Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Foundation, recognizes the best published or unpublished paper written by a member of AACAP. The winning paper addresses the use of psychodynamic psychotherapy in clinical practice and fosters development, teaching, and practice of psychodynamic and psychotherapy in child and adolescent psychiatry.

Eunice Yuen, MD, PhD, is an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at the Yale School of Medicine. She is a neuroscientist and child and adolescent psychiatrist by training and currently Associate Medical Director at the Parent and Family Development Program of Yale Child Study Center. Dr. Yuen’s interests in children’s mental health covers from basic science on genetics and neurobiology to community-based advocacy, clinical intervention, and medical education. Dr. Yuen grew up in Hong Kong and is now a mother of two Asian American children. This unique background fosters her academic interests in Asian American youth and family mental health through a cross-cultural/generational lens. She is the Founder and Director of Yale CHATogether, a family-centered program using theatrical vignettes as educational tools and clinical intervention to promote mental health in adolescents, young adults, and parents. Dr. Yuen is also the principal investigator of the Acting Together Program, a culturally informed clinical education initiative tailored for interprofessional healthcare trainees through improvisation and theater.

Thank you to AACAP and the Rieger Foundation for this honor. It has been humbling to learn and grow together with my colleagues, patients, and their families on my young endeavor—Compassionate Home, Action Together (CHATogether). This journey has embarked under the shadow of the COVID-19 pandemic, sailed across communities, and now began to explore a new horizon—the families. I hope we can continue to foster innovative application of psychodynamic psychotherapeutic concepts with more compassionate providers and families for our children and adolescents.

AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Service Program Award for Excellence

Shawn Singh Sidhu, MD

The AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Service Program Award for Excellence recognizes innovative programs that address prevention, diagnosis, or treatment of mental illness in children and adolescents and serve as model programs to the community. Supported by the Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Foundation, the Award was established in 1996.

Shawn Singh Sidhu, MD, is currently a Professor of Psychiatry at the University of California San Diego School of Medicine, where he serves as Program Director for the UCSD Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Program. As a child of Sikh immigrants, Dr. Sidhu was infused as a young child with the mantra, “the world’s problems are your problems.” This ancestral emphasis on social activism led him to spend a summer at Mother Teresa’s Home of the Dying and Destitute and AIDS Orphanage as a teenager, where he witnessed poverty at a scale previously incomprehensible to him. He was inspired by the patients he met, who while they literally had nothing of monetary value, managed to maintain a loving “we will overcome” outlook on life. This experience ignited a spark within him to partner with underserved populations for the rest of his life. Dr. Sidhu has served Native American populations in four states, both on reservation and via telehealth, and now as Co-Founder and Director of the Vista Hill Native American SmartCare Program, a pediatric mental health access program currently serving 9 tribal-facing healthcare sites in the state of California. Dr. Sidhu has also trained over 1,500 healthcare providers in how to conduct asylum evaluations for migrants. He serves as a faculty member for the Asylum Medicine Training Initiative, which has seen over 42,000 page views from 12,000 unique visitors from over 80 countries.

The AACAP Jeanne Spurlock, MD, Lecture and Award on Diversity and Culture recognizes individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the recruitment of child and adolescent psychiatry from all cultures. This award was established in 2012 in honor of Jeanne Spurlock, MD, a giant in child and adolescent psychiatry and in advocacy for children, adolescents, and their families from all cultures.

Beverly J. Stoute, MD, is a leader and advocate in child, adolescent, and adult psychiatry and psychoanalysis. She is internationally recognized for transforming psychoanalytic and developmental perspectives on race awareness and addressing implicit bias in healthcare in her work as an organizational consultant, scholar, clinician, and educator.

Dr. Stoute’s innovations embrace integrative psychoanalytic treatment approaches for children and adults with complex severe psychiatric illness, complex trauma, and neurodivergent learning styles by combining psychodynamic perspectives with community advocacy and forensic assessment. Dr. Stoute is a Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, a Distinguished Fellow of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, the recipient of the Academy’s 2018 Rieger Award in Psychodynamic Psychotherapy, and 2024 Yale School of Medicine Department of Psychiatry Distinguished Alumni Award. Her scholarly work, translated into German, Spanish, and Portuguese, is primary reading in training programs and featured in the archives of the Freud Museum in London.

Dr. Jeanne Spurlock, a groundbreaking child and adult psychiatrist and psychoanalyst, and fearless servant leader, worked tirelessly to combat the traumatic deprivation that poverty, racism, sexism, and all forms of discrimination inflict on children. Having my work recognized as continuing her legacy is a distinct honor and privilege. As an African American child, adolescent, and adult psychiatrist and psychoanalyst, I hope to continue the work she championed. I extend my deep gratitude to AACAP for bestowing this honor on me.

AACAP George Tarjan, MD, Award for Contributions in Developmental Disabilities

Jessica A. Hellings, MD

The AACAP George Tarjan, MD, Award for Contributions in Developmental Disabilities recognizes a child and adolescent psychiatrist and AACAP member who has made significant contributions in a lifetime career or single seminal work to the understanding or care in the field of intellectual and developmental disabilities. The award was established in 1993 in honor of former AACAP President George Tarjan, MD (1977–79), by his wife, Mrs. George Tarjan and friends.

Jessica A. Hellings, MD, is a professor of psychiatry at the University of Missouri- Kansas City. Her training in psychiatry was from the University of the Witwatersrand in Johannesburg, South Africa. She completed a fellowship in child and adolescent psychiatry at the University of Kansas Medical Center, and is ABPN board certified in general psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry. She developed specialty services for individuals of all ages with developmental disabilities at University of Kansas Medical Center, The Ohio State Nisonger Center, and for the state of Missouri. She served as a reviewer for NIMH and multiple journals, and performed NIMH- and NICHD-funded clinical trials. Her clinical and research work for the past 40 years spans psychopharmacology for severe challenging behaviors in children, adolescents, and adults with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) and Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities (IDD), including aggression, self-injury, and property destruction. She also studies older drugs warranting trials in ASD/IDD including low dose loxapine and amitriptyline, which show promise in this population and are becoming increasingly used. Minimally verbal individuals and treatment resistance are an important focus of her clinical work and research. The gut-brain axis, celiac disease, and non-celiac gluten sensitivity in neuropsychiatric illness are more recent areas of focus, about which she has co-authored a new book. She is president of her local branch of the American Association of University Women. She is active in increasing psychiatry training program focus on ASD/IDD, and serves on the Missouri board of ECHO Developmental Disabilities.

Over the years, he explored various fields, including working as a research fellow at the NIH, a photographer, and a food blogger, before starting medical school at UC Irvine. He quickly found his calling in psychiatry and was matched at UC Davis Medical Center for residency. During training, he developed a keen interest in psychotherapy and pursued an additional two-year psychodynamic therapy training at the San Francisco Center for Psychoanalysis. He often found psychodynamic readings inaccessible and esoteric, especially for early learners such as medical students and residents. This frustration inspired him to create his YouTube channel, “Good Enough Psychiatrist,” where he explored psychodynamic concepts through bite-sized animations. The channel has slowly gained followers, and it has amassed over 100K views.
